Children's Champion

It is only when one engages Jamie-Lea in conversation that one truly begins to comprehend the incredible tenacity, moral purpose and intuitive sense of justice of this remarkable young person. Jamie-Lea first came to my attention when she was organising her Year 10 work placement with **MP Sue Hayman**, I was immediately struck by her steely determination and positive approach; needless to say, Jamie-Lea did exactly what she set out to do and got the absolute most from the experience.



At the age of fourteen, Jamie-Lea first became involved with the **Children's Rights Alliance for England**. She was part of the team that instigated a national consultation, identifying a list of the forty most important issues affecting children. From this the team constructed a report of recommendations which were submitted to **United Nations** and UK government under the title 'A **Better Life for Children**'.

Jamie-Lea was invited to **Switzerland** along with twenty two other delegates from all over the UK, drawn from all sectors of society to give a presentation to the United Nations. From this initial delegation, two key persons were selected from each of the countries of the United Kingdom for an in-depth six hour interview with many key organisations including the head of **UNICEF** (The United Nations Children's Fund), **UNCRC** (Convention on the Rights of Children), **Save the Children** and the **Children's Commissioner for England**, **Anne Longfield OBE**. Jamie-Lea was one of the two persons selected to represent the views of children in England.

The conclusions were sent as recommendations to the UK government to improve the lives of children. One of the key recommendations was ensuring that any child and their family do not stay in temporary accommodation for longer than six weeks. Jamie-Lea is part of the national team who communicates with children's charities, MPs, social workers, councils and the government to ensure this directive is adhered to for the benefit of children.

Jamie-Lea is a sergeant in the Army Cadets, Maryport detachment; she teaches skills to younger cadets, has completed her Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award, recently undertook a three day exercise alongside army regulars, which Jamie acknowledged was 'Tough!'. In addition to this, Jamie-Lea has applied to take part in a wilderness expedition to Canada with the Army Cadets this summer, which will include canoeing, mountain climbing and skiing.

She is studying the Extended Diploma in Health and social Care, which is equivalent to 3 A Levels; Jamie-Lea is expected to achieve **three Distinction stars**. This February half-term, Jamie secured a **'Dream Placement'** at West Cumberland Infirmary, to support her career ambition to become a Mental Health Nurse.

Jamie-Lea's teachers are unanimous in their commendation, 'Jamie-Lea is a first-class student, amazing young person and inspiration to other students'. Jamie-Lea is extremely modest about her achievements, simply seeing it as her moral imperative.

Jamie-Lea is a special person and a champion of Netherhall School.

Marvellous Mathematician

Hot off the plane from New York! Lewis has just returned from The Big Apple, where he has been with Netherhall School Sixth Form on a cultural visit. Lewis is now preparing for his Year 13 mock exams and despite being a little jetlagged, Lewis is happy to engage me in conversation about his recent achievement in maths. As anyone who knows maths will tell you, there are people who do maths and there are mathematicians: mathematicians being the ones who have a natural flair and ability for mathematics – Lewis is such a person.

Mr Williams, Lewis's Further Maths teacher and Mr Mullarkey, Lewis's A Level Maths teacher are incredibly proud of Lewis, 'Lewis is a first-class mathematician, a super student and a delightful young man.'



Lewis recently sat the TMUA (Test of Mathematics for University Admission), which is recognised by universities as an opportunity for a prospective maths student to demonstrate essential mathematical thinking and reasoning skills. The test comprises forty questions, on two papers of 75 minutes each, without the use of a calculator – the test is very similar to the UKMT maths challenge. A scaled score of 4.5 is considered to be a pass; Lewis achieved a score of 5.9.

Despite interest from Oxford University and Cambridge University, Lewis has decided to attend the university currently ranked as **Number 1** for mathematics in the country, which is Lancaster University. Initially, Lewis's offer from Lancaster University was dependent on him attaining AAB at A Level. Following Lewis's performance in the TMAU test, Lancaster University have made Lewis an unconditional offer. Despite the unconditional offer – which by Lewis's own admission '**Does take the pressure off!**', he remains determined to attain A*s across the board.

In addition to Lewis's brilliant academic ability, he is the Deputy Head Boy of the School, plays for the Sixth Form football team, assists younger students to improve their reading every morning and is in the process of completing his Duke of Edinburgh Gold Award. In addition to this, he is a polite, positive and super young man.

Lewis is a marvellous mathematician and a champion of Netherhall School.

Academic and Tennis Ace – Megan Almond

Star Netherhall School student, Megan Almond is not just an academic ace; she is a tennis superstar. Megan attained **8A*s and 1A** grade in last summer's GCSE results and is currently achieving **A grades** in A Level chemistry, biology and maths with the intention of an **Oxbridge** education, studying medicine. Megan has already attended the 'Outreach Programme' at Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge University – which she loved, and is attending the 'Outreach Programme' at Oxford University later this year.



As one can tell, Megan is not someone who accepts anything but the best, a mantra which Megan applies to all of her passions. In addition to her academic excellence, Megan has won an incredible **28 County titles**. In the most recent County Championships of August 2017, Megan won a remarkable six titles at U16, U18 Ladies Singles, U18 Girls and Ladies Doubles titles and the U18 Mixed Doubles title.

Megan has played for Cumbria every year since the age of 9, representing the Cumbria County Ladies Team for the first time in November 2013 at the tender age of 12. In a 12 month period following this, Megan went on to achieve the outstanding feat of representing Cumbria at U12, U14, U18 and the Cumbria County Ladies Team. In November of 2017, Megan won 3 out of 3 of her singles matches, playing at Number 1 for Cumbria in the Ladies Winter County Cup Competition in Boston, Lincolnshire.

Megan has played in various women's **Aegon British Tour** events since the age of 14 and went on to win her first British Tour in Glasgow in October 2016 aged 15, which took her ranking up to Number 9 in Great Britain in the U16 age group.

Megan has played numerous times at Wimbledon, competing in the 'Road to Wimbledon' competition in 2012, aged 11 and in the 2013 competition, aged 12. In addition to this, Megan has won numerous Regional Grade 3 competitions in both singles and doubles formats of the game, recently winning an U18 Grade 3 Singles tournament in Leeds in October 2017.

An indication of Megan's amazing determination and commitment is that she currently trains two afternoons a week at the Northumberland High Performance Tennis Centre in Newcastle, which takes two hours travelling time each way. On Tuesday, Megan trains from 1.00pm-8.00pm and on Thursday from 3.00pm-8.00pm. A typical training session for Megan will comprise of individual coaching, speed and agility training, strength and conditioning, and squad coaching. In addition to this, Megan is on the AASE (Advanced Apprenticeship in Sporting Excellence) programme for tennis, which involves coursework as well as tennis and fitness training. If this wasn't enough, Megan is doing her Level 1 Tennis Coach course in February, 2018.

Megan is incredibly modest and humble of her considerable achievements and tremendous talent. She is quick to acknowledge the remarkable support of her family and the contribution of many excellent coaches: David Wise, Tracy Burrus, her long-time coach, Chris Whittle and her inspirational friend Daneika Borthwick. Megan's heroes are tennis legend, Andy Murray and the tenacious Kim Clijsters.

Megan's teachers couldn't be more complimentary of her outstanding work ethic and brilliant attitude to her studies, as they all say, 'Megan is a brilliant student and a pleasure to teach.' Head of Sixth Form, Mr Bailey said, 'Megan is an excellent role model and inspiration to other students.'

Star Netherhall School student, Chloe Copeland was invited to the House of Commons for a special reception by the Holocaust Education Trust.

Each year, Netherhall School is invited by the Holocaust Education Trust to send two A Level history students to visit Auschwitz, as part of the 'Lessons from Auschwitz Ambassador' programme.

The trust was so impressed with the quality of Chloe's report and her work with younger Netherhall School students on the Holocaust, they invited Chloe to an invitation-only reception at the House of Commons. The invitation was exclusively for a small group of students and Members of Parliament to listen to survivors of the Holocaust. Chloe said, 'The experience was truly amazing; the stories from Holocaust survivors were extremely harrowing and emphasise the importance of remembering what happened, learning from the past and ensuring this kind of thing can never happen again.'

Chloe is studying history, French and geography and has been offered a place to read history at Newcastle University. Chloe is well on-track to achieve her offer grades, having achieved an A* in her recent A Level history mock exam.

Mr Bailey, Head of Sixth Form and Chloe's history teacher said, 'Chloe is a fabulous student, an excellent historian and a credit to Netherhall School; I could not be more proud of her.'

Sophie first went to the sea cadets, which is situated on the Prom in Maryport with friends at the age of 10. Sophie loved every opportunity and challenge, attaining her First Aid qualification, taking part in sailing, rowing, seamanship and kayaking competitions. Sophie recently competed in the **national sea cadet championships**, getting through to the second round in sail handling and through to the **national finals in kayak polo in London**.

Through Sophie's talent and endeavour she is hoping to qualify for a place aboard the **Royal Navy training ship HMS Jerwood**, which Sophie hopes to be able to take up some time after this summer's GCSE examinations.

Durham University Supported Progression

Congratulations also go out to Year 12 students Ryan Moore, Esme Rowe and Brad King who have been successful in their applications to participate in this year's Supported Progression Programme at Durham University. Ryan has been selected to take part in the mathematical sciences programme, Esme will follow the modern languages and cultures programme while Brad will take part in the primary education programme. All three students should be very proud of their achievement in being picked from thousands of applicants and will now enjoy a first class experience at one of the country's finest academic institutions. The first stage of the programme will be a one day welcome event on the 10th February before a spring residential is held during the Easter holidays with a final summer school in August. An assessed project will then be completed and the results of this will allow the university to offer students an undergraduate place at Durham University from the autumn of 2019 at a lower UCAS tariff offer than would normally be the case. Current Year 13 student Kelly Pearce has already benefitted from this programme and has accepted an offer to read biosciences at Durham University this autumn and looks forward to the opportunity immensely.

The work produced was of an excellent standard and the students behaved maturely, ensuring they made the most of this fantastic opportunity.


I'd like to also thank the University for continuing to provide us with these excellent opportunities for our students; it makes a huge difference.



Artist of the Fortnight

Laura Haig – Year 13

The theme for my project is beauty and imperfection; I have chosen to focus my paintings on feet as this was the insecurity of my subject. Jam (not homemade)


Instant mash potato

Managing Medication Procedures – Important information for parents/carers



We recognise that from time to time students may require medication within the school day. However, we do have to adhere to guidelines to ensure the safety of our students. With this in mind, we would like to point out some procedures that we must follow:

- Some students may need to take prescribed medicines during their time in school. This will usually only be for a short time period, e.g. to finish a course of antibiotics. Parents/guardians must come into school and arrange this with reception.
- Children should not be sent to school with their own medicine (prescribed or non-prescribed) as this poses a health and safety risk to other children.
- Staff will not administer non-prescribed medication i.e. paracetamol, unless there are exceptional circumstances and where there is specific prior written permission from a parent/guardian.
- If a child suffers regularly from frequent or acute pain parents should refer the matter to their child's GP.

Parents/guardians have the prime responsibility for their child's health and should provide the school with timely, complete information about their child's medical condition. If your child has a medical condition that we do not know about, please contact the school, your child's Head of Year or Mrs C Savage (Assistant SENCO).
