Morning Maths

All pupils in Years 10 and 11 have received mathematics revision guides and workbooks for use in

registration at least 4 mornings per week. This will allow pupils to consolidate and extend their understanding of mathematical topics which they will be assessed on in their GCSE.

The extra 15 minutes of mathematics in the morning may not initially appear to be a significant amount of time, but if we do the maths...

At least 15 minutes per day extra:

- = at least 60 minutes extra maths practice per week
- = at least 1440 minutes (24 hours) extra maths practice before Year 11 pupils sit their GCSE
- = at least 3000 minutes (50 hours) extra maths practice before Year 10 pupils sit their GCSE

This extra practice, <u>along with independent revision at home</u> will further enhance their mathematical understanding and give all pupils the opportunity to aim for higher grades in the challenging 9-1 mathematics GCSE.

"Wobbly Words" ... Spelling Intervention Sessions Years 7-9

Winnie the Pooh has always been full of wise words - and none more so than his adage about spelling.

It can often be a barrier to success when writing in class and ultimately in exams, and is one of the biggest issues for those who find writing a challenge.

Here at Netherhall, we are running regular spelling intervention sessions for targeted pupils to try and help. Pupils who have a spelling age that is significantly lower than their chronological age are attending short sessions, four times a week, to try and secure strategies to help with their spelling issues.



The aim is to create a forum outside the busy school day, where the sole focus is on improving spelling, and subsequently, increasing self-confidence when faced with the challenge of independent writing. Pupils attending the sessions said the following...

"I enjoy coming to these morning sessions. My spellings are getting a little bit better each day"

"I think it has helped me so much with my spelling cross all subjects"

"It's made me think about if the word looks right, and where I put the letters"

arrived at the research centre in Lochranza to a warm welcome. We all got settled into our rooms to get ready for the next few days...


Rising early to a made breakfast we prepared to go out on the beach between Lochranza and Catacol for the day. The weather was cold but suitable to still work in. We split into our groups after

Managing Medication Procedures - Important information for parents/carers



We recognise that from time to time students may require medication within the school day. However, we do have to adhere to guidelines to ensure the safety of our students. With this in mind, we would like to point out some procedures that we must follow:

- Some students may need to take prescribed medicines during their time in school. This will usually only be for a short time period, e.g. to finish a course of antibiotics. Parents/guardians must come into school and arrange this with reception.
- Children should not be sent to school with their own medicine (prescribed or non-prescribed) as this poses a health and safety risk to other children.
- Staff will not administer non-prescribed medication i.e. paracetamol, unless there are exceptional circumstances and where there is specific prior written permission from a parent/guardian.
- If a child suffers regularly from frequent or acute pain parents should refer the matter to their child's GP.

Parents/guardians have the prime responsibility for their child's health and should provide the school with timely, complete information about their child's medical condition. If your child has a medical condition that we do not know about, please contact the school, your child's Head of Year or Mrs C Savage (Assistant SENCO).
