Careers Events at Netherhall

During this half term, there have been several visitors speaking to students about careers and employability.



Year 10 students participated in a workshop run by the London Museum and the React Foundation to design and build devices for transporting water. Students developed their employability skills during the workshop, including teamwork, communicating effectively, negotiation and using their initiative.

Year 9 students had an assembly led by Sophie Palmer from the Nuclear Decommissioning Agency (NDA) to encourage young people to be 'Social Media Savvy'. Employers are increasingly using social media profiles to discover more about potential candidates. As well as finding out



about safe use of social media, students were asked to consider how they can use their accounts positively in the years to come to ensure they give the best possible impression to future employers.

On Monday, 9th September we had a visit from Morton Lenholm from JET labs near Oxford. Morton has the illustrious task of flipping the switch that turns on the only nuclear fusion reactor in the UK! Nuclear fusion is thought to be the future of electricity generation to answer the world's needs. It produces no long-lived radioactive isotopes and the ingredients are readily available from sea-water. Morton has been part of the development of this reactor; the only one in the world that has actually output more electricity than was used to start nuclear fusion (think "Doc Ock" in Spiderman).

Morton gave a talk to physics groups in years 9, 10 11, 12 and 13, and then answered questions from a small group of sixth formers.

Dear Parent/Guardian

PARENT GOVERNOR ELECTION

I am writing to inform you of a vacancy on the school governing body for a parent governor. Details of the process to fill the vacancy follow.

THE NOMINATION OF PARENTS AS CANDIDATES

Each parent* of a pupil attending the school is to be given the opportunity of putting their name forward with a view to becoming a parent governor. If you want to submit a nomination on your behalf you should do so, in writing, to the Clerk. Letters of nomination must be countersigned by two sponsors, who must also be parents of children currently attending the school. The closing date for the receipt of nominations by the school is Wednesday, 30 October 2019. Please note that incomplete nominations will not be accepted.

In the event of there being no more than one nomination, the person nominated will automatically be elected, unopposed as a parent governor.

THE ELECTION PROCEDURE

If the school receives more nominations than vacancies, an election by secret ballot will be held as soon as possible. Each parent* of a child who at the time of the election is a pupil at the school will be entitled to vote.

In the event of an election, the Clerk will issue all parents with further details concerning the way in which the ballot (which will be entirely secret and as fool proof as possible) is to be organised and supply the official ballot papers.

CANDIDATES' CONTRIBUTION TO THE ELECTION

Candidates will be given the opportunity to write a short statement, which will be circulated to all parents of the school. Should candidates wish to seek support in any other way, this will be entirely their own responsibility.

Following an election, parents will be told the name of the successful candidate.

TERM OF OFFICE OF PARENT GOVERNORS

An elected parent governor will hold office for a period of four years.

PARENTS' PARTICIPATION

It is very important for the efficiency and effectiveness of schools that parents should be encouraged to have an active involvement in their children's education. Consequently, parents are encouraged to participate and take an interest in the election process whether as candidates or voters.

*DEFINITION OF "PARENT"

Section 576 of the Education Act 1996 defines "parent" to include:

- all biological parents, whether they are married or not; and
- any person who, although not a biological parent, has parental responsibility for a child or young person this could be an adoptive parent, a step-parent, guardian or other relative; and
- any person who, although not a biological parent and does not have parental responsibility, has care of a child or young person.



Managing Medication Procedures - Important information for parents/carers



We recognise that from time to time students may require medication within the school day. However, we do have to adhere to guidelines to ensure the safety of our students.

With this in mind, we would like to point out some procedures that we must follow:

- Some students may need to take prescribed medicines during their time in school. This will usually only be for a short time period, e.g. to finish a course of antibiotics. Parents/guardians must come into school and arrange this with reception.
- Children should not be sent to school with their own medicine (prescribed or non-prescribed) as this poses a health and safety risk to other children.
- Staff will not administer non-prescribed medication i.e. paracetamol, unless there are exceptional circumstances and where there is specific prior written permission from a parent/guardian.
- If a child suffers regularly from frequent or acute pain parents should refer the matter to their child's GP.

Parents/guardians have the prime responsibility for their child's health and should provide the school with timely, complete information about their child's medical condition. If your child has a medical condition that we do not know about, please contact the school, your child's Head of Year or Mrs B Johnstone.

English Schools' Fell Running Championships

At 8 o'clock on Sunday the 6th October, when most of us were still enjoying a Sunday lie-in, a group of fell runners from Netherhall School set off for Giggleswick in Yorkshire to compete in **the English Schools Fell Running Championships**. Year 7s; Ryan Moore, Daniel Drozdowski, Lucas Hetherington and year 8; Noah Hearn have all been training both in school time and at the Friday after school Cross-Country and Fell Running Club.











Whilst the running distances they did were 1.68 miles for the year 7s and 2.61 miles for the year 8s, the height gain for each race was an enormous 428ft for the year 7s and 675ft for the year 8s! The students had to run through rivers and up and back down a very slippery hill and through a muddy wood. After an equipment check (they had to carry a waterproof and hat in a bum-bag or rucksack) and safety briefing (what to do on the fell if someone fell down and was injured), all four students threw themselves off into the mud and did fantastically well and everyone even managed a sprint finish!

Bronze Duke of Edinburgh

Another swimmingly successful Duke of Edinburgh Expedition!

For those of you who may have missed our previous article on our Duke of Edinburgh award expeditions, here is a short insight:

The Duke of Edinburgh award requires participants to allocate a proportion of their time to volunteering, sport and skill (distinct from sport) as well as an expedition which they must plan appropriately. This requires some real tenacious individuals who have a lust to succeed in the face of adversity; the award is a challenge and those who complete it should be proud of their achievements.

The group of students had completed their practice expedition in the beautiful summer of 2019 in an area near Cockermouth. Throughout the practice, they had impressed and shown real aptitude for navigation and proven their endurance. Now, all that they needed to complete was their assessed practical. As we counted down to the 12th and 13th of September, all eyes were on the weather forecast; rain had been forecast and typically, the prediction was true.

Students checked their bags carefully early on the morning of Thursday, 12thSeptember, ensuring that everything had been protected from the rain. Particular attention was paid to their phones and their food, and after loading up the transport, the group headed into the valley of wet, otherwise known as Borrowdale.

Despite the unfortunately wet start to the expedition, spirits were high and the group of students donned waterproofs with seemingly excited faces. They were happily chatting about the route, the sweets they had stashed away in pockets and what they were going to get up to at the campsite that evening. Maps and compasses were sorted between the groups, and debates on the correct direction to set off in began.











After only a few minutes of discussion, the students located their positions on the maps, and set about the route they had planned; everyone wanted to get under the cover of the trees as quickly as possible. The students made good progress and helped each other through some tricky points of navigation. Throughout the day, they discussed the route in their groups and ensured they were on the right track; nobody wanted to walk the wrong direction through a deluge only to have to do an about turn!

The group made good progress, staying on time and on track and engaged well with other walkers; staff were full of pride each time the groups interacted with the public, whether it be holding gates open, giving right of way or indeed with one particular student helping another walker cross a flooded section of path. Throughout the day, spirits remained high despite the squelching feet and slippery mud; often sections of path where submerged and somewhat difficult to navigate.

Whilst all maintained a positive outlook, it was a relief when the campsite came into sight, and the lure of warm showers, food and dry tents became the favourite topic of discussion. On the campsite, the students made sure each other were well, warm and as comfortable as could be, and enjoyed cooking their food under cover. Once all were fed and happy, and the debate of why one of the tents smelled of cheesy pasta sauce was put to rest, the students settled into actives, and it appears hide and seek in failing light is still a favourite past time.

The next day, much delight was taken by some students when waking the others, and after a groggy start for some, breakfast was underway; the never-ending search for matches, cutlery and can openers began. Students slowly got ready, finding pieces of kit from the previous day and got ready for another full day's walking, with the added benefit that today, there was sun!



Students separated into their groups and set off at a good pace; they navigated themselves well, and enjoyed some brilliant views along their walk. Again, they showed utmost respect to other walkers and when asked displayed pride in their school. They completed the day in good time and with good spirits.

All in all, the students were, as always, a real credit to themselves; they were polite, respectful and enthusiastic, expressing a real enthusiasm to succeed. They should be proud of their achievements, and many have stated a desire to complete future expeditions, showing a true appreciation of the award.

Lastly, we should like to express how proud we are of the groups, and thank them for their positive, heart-warming actions over the two-day expedition. It is a true delight to work with such effervescent young people.
